### PNP CONDEMNS SELECTIVE TARGETING OF WOMEN IN POLITICS

The People's National Party (PNP) expresses deep disappointment over the increasing calls for the dismissal of the Greater Accra Regional Minister following comments considered offensive by some members of the public. The Minister has publicly apologised and retracted her statement, yet the pressure for her removal continues to intensify.

The PNP believes that Ghana's political space has developed a worrying culture where women are subjected to harsher public judgement and political punishment than men. In both the NPP and NDC, several male politicians and government officials have been linked to actions and controversies that could have justified resignation or dismissal, yet they continued to hold office without the same level of coordinated pressure.

Unfortunately, when the issue involves a woman, there is often a loud and aggressive campaign for her removal. This pattern was evident in the cases of Vicky Hammah, Betty Mould-Iddrisu, Dzifa Attivor, and Cecilia Dapaah. The continued targeting of women in leadership positions sends a dangerous message to young Ghanaian women aspiring to enter public service and politics.

The PNP also finds it troubling that some individuals and groups calling for strict enforcement of the code of conduct appear silent on other matters involving allegations of conflict of interest, abuse of office, and contradictory public statements by powerful government officials who remain comfortably in their positions.

Selective accountability undermines public confidence in governance and weakens the credibility of our democratic institutions. Justice and accountability must be applied fairly and consistently, regardless of gender, political affiliation, or status.

The silence of some civil society organisations and women's advocacy groups on issues affecting women in politics is equally concerning. Organisations that claim to defend women's rights must not speak only when it is politically convenient.

The PNP is therefore calling on the media, religious leaders, civil society organisations, and all well-meaning Ghanaians to speak against the growing culture of politically targeting women. Both Jesus Christ and Prophet Mohammed stood for justice, dignity, and compassion towards women. Our religious institutions must not remain silent when women are subjected to unfair treatment in the public space.

The PNP remains committed to justice, fairness, equality before the law, and the protection of women in leadership.
